ABOUT THE PROJECT

EU Twinning project "Strengthening Capacities of Internal Control in the Fight against Corruption within the Ministry of Interior" [SR 15 IPA JH 01 18] was jointly implemented by the Special Investigation Service of the Republic of Lithuania and the Anti-Corruption General Directorate of Romania, in cooperation with the Internal Affairs Sector [IAS] of the Ministry of Interior of the Republic of Serbia [Mol RS].

The financial assistance for project implementation in the total amount of €1 million was provided from the EU's Instrument for Pre-Accession Assistance [IPA], more precisely - the financial IPA package for 2015.

The project implementation commenced on 01 March 2019 and should have lasted 18 months, until 31 August 2020. Taken into consideration that the entire world, including the Republic of Serbia, was severely impacted by the SARS-CoV-2 virus and the resulting COVID-19 pandemic, the project implementation was suspended during the summer 2020. It restarted in the fall, until its official end on 20 December 2020.

Alongside the general goal of the project to support the Republic of Serbia in its fight against corruption in line with the recommendations from Chapter 23 and Chapter 24 action plans, the specific and concrete project activities sought to build and strengthen the existing capacities of IAS with a focus on corruption prevention mechanisms, investigation skills, property declaration checks, intelligence and operational data gathering and processing, IT system upgrading, etc.

ABOUT THE PROJECT PARTNERS

Beneficiary administration: INTERNAL AFFAIRS SECTOR, MINISTRY OF INTERIOR [REPUBLIC OF SERBIA]

Established in 2003 as the Inspector General's Service of the Ministry of Interior of the Republic of Serbia. Upon the adoption of the Law on Police in 2006, the Inspector General's Service received a name change to the Internal Police Affairs Sector with its mandate, tasks and competencies defined for the very first time.

However, once the new Law on Police came into force in 2016, the Internal Police Affairs Sector was renamed 'Internal Affairs Sector' in order to reflect the all-encompassing nature of its mandate revolving around controlling the legality of work of not just the police officers, but, rather, all the Ministry of Interior employees. In addition, the said new Law on Police expanded the Sector's competencies and introduced new corruption prevention institutes and measures.

Main anti-corruption law enforcement agency accountable to the President of the Republic of Lithuania and the Lithuanian Parliament. It was established in 1997 under the Ministry of Interior. In 2000, it became an independent institution. The Special Investigation Service investigates high-level corruption cases that can cause considerable damage to the state. The key areas of the Service's activities are criminal investigations and criminal intelligence gathering related to high-level corruption crimes, corruption prevention, anti-corruption education and analytical anti-corruption intelligence endeavors.

INNOVATIVE PROJECT VISIBILITY APPROACH

Guided by the Lithuanian good practice examples, as well as the expressed needs of the beneficiary administration, the EU Twinning project implementation team decided to approach the process of visibility material development in a nontraditional, atypical and innovative manner.

Alongside the well-known, typical visibility materials, such as pens, notebooks, folders, and tote bags, the project implementation team decided to design and produce backpacks and wireless power banks that could be of significant use and importance during inspectors' fieldwork assignments. Moreover, in order to make the project as visible and recognizable as possible, white pocket-sized metal boxes filled with peppermint candies bearing the sign "Vitamin I - Immunity for Integrity" were also produced and disseminated.







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
